Cheese Sauce for Asparagus



Fresh asparagus will be appearing in quantities with increasing warmer days. It makes a fine luncheon or supper main dish when cooked tender and served with a creamy cheese sauce on toast. Add hard-cooked eggs sliced to increase the protein. An easy way to prepare fresh asparagus is to stand tied bundles of stalks in a tall kettle, add boiling water and allow the tender tips to cook by steaming.

Creamy Cheese Sauce. Melt 2 tablespoons butter or margarine in saucepan and stir in tablespoons flour. Gradually add 1 cup milk, stirring constantly and cook until thickened and smooth. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt. 1/4 teaspoon pepper and ½ cup grated

cheese. Stir over low heat until cheese is melted. Serve hot.

Easy way to prepare prunes in summer is to fill a quart jar with tenderized prunes, add boiling water to cover, and put on the jar lid. Keep in the efrigerator for a few days and then serve.

Veal in Sour Cream. Have I pound veal cut about sinch thick. Cut in serving pieces, dredge in mixture of flour, salt and pepper. Melt 4 tablespoons shortening in skillet, add veal and saute slowly until browned. Remove from pan; keep warm in oven Add 2 teaspoons flour to drippings in skillet, blend well and gradually stir in 112 cups sour cream, 4 tablespoons drained sweet pickle relish and salt and pepper to faste. Heat thoroughly Pour cream pickle sauce over the browned meat. It is excellent served with

Texas Hash.

Cook 2 onions, sliced, and 2 green peppers, cut fine, in 3 tablespoons fat until onions are yellow. Add 1 pound ground meat and cook until browned. Add 2 cups canned tomatoes, ½ cup un-cooked rice, 1 teaspoon chili pow-der, 2 teaspoons salt and ¼ tea-spoon pepper. Mix well. Pour into large greased casserole, cover and bake in moderate oven 45 minutes.

ILLINOIS FAIR PLANS CONTESTS IN HOME FLOWER DISPLAYS

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. — Floral decorations for different occasions ranging from informal luncheons to Christmas dinners will be displayed in competitive classes at this year's Illinois State Fair, Aug. 10 through 19. A total of \$1638 in cash prizes will be awarded

Because of the increasing attention Illinois women are giving to flower displays and to flower gardens, the te Fair has gardens, the the Fair has modeled its program to include the largest flower and garden show in its history. Radio Hall, on the southeast corner of the fairground, has been converted into Floral Hall and will now be listed under that title.

A new set of rules and classifi-

eations has been devised for the show. The new classes in arrange-ments have been worked out to ments have been worked out to provide emphasis on floral decorations to fit the present mode of living. These include buffet table, informal luncheons and dinners, Christmas dinner, holiday tables and as pecial feature for youths, a buffet table entitled "After the Game."

Another new feature will be mantle displays shown on actual

mantle displays shown on actual mantles, and holiday decorations for doors on actual doors. There will also be a special educational exhibits display in which non-pro-fessionals can enter.

NEW POSTAL MONEY ORDER PUNCHED CARD GOES ON SALE

A new type of postal money or-der, which differs in appearance from the previous flimsy type,

went on sale here

The new order is a punched card, which can be run through I.B.M. machines. It may be cashed at any bank or post office anywhere in the United States without payment of a fee. Formerly postal money orders could merly postal money orders could be cashed without fee only in the community on which they were drawn.

After cashing, the new orders will pass through the Federal Reserve Bank to the new general accounting office The new accounting office is one of 12 regional centers replacing a former central accounting department at Asheville, N.C.

DISCOUNTS HEALTH BENEFITS FROM SUNTANNED SKIN

SPRINGFIELD, IH .- "A suntan will give you a rugged, outdoor appearance, but do not kid yourself that you are doing it for your
'health," advises Dr. Roland R.
Cross, director of the Department of Public Health. "Chances
are that light skinned persons
will be just as healthy as the
rugged type who suffer perspiring days in the sun."

Man doesn't require prolonged
exposure to the sun's rays to remain healthy, Dr. Cross stated.
Natural sunshine or a satisfactory
substitute is essential to infants appearance, but do not kid your-

substitute is essential to infants and children, but many adults seem to thrive during long ab-

sences of exposure to sunshine.

Belief that a suntan promotes good health is a popular miscon-

ception, according to Dr. Cross. It will enable a person to stay in the sun without burning, but when a child is treated with sunshine for rickets, the doctor tries

shine for rickets, the doctor tries to prevent tanning which retards absorption of the sun's rays.

People should make special efforts to avoid severe or even slight sunburn. In addition to the extreme pain in the burned areas of the body, sunburn symptoms may include headache, nausea, high fever, rapid pulse or delirium and collapse. There have been reports of death resulting from severe sunburn.
