John A. Barnett, 74, injured Saturday when a bull knocked him against a wall at the Barnett farm near Maroa, died in Decatur and Macon County Hospital at 9:15 a. m. yesterday.

A physician said Mr. Barnett died from a combination of stomach injuries and a heart condition.

Coroner Harold Brintlinger will hold an inquest.

The body is in the Herington Funeral Home in Clinton, where services will be held at 2 p. mo Thursday. Burial will be in Mc-Climans Cemetery at Hallsville.

John Anderson Barnett was born in Missouri March 23, 1880, a son of John A. and Sidney Fruit Barnett. He married Meryle Bartley Duff June 25, 1900, at Hallsville.

Besides his wife he leaves two sons, Duff C., Decatur, and Harry Dale, Macon; a daughter, Mrs. Donna Marie Mintler, Mt. Zion; a sister Mrs. Mamie Bartley, Hallsville; and two brothers, Arthur A., Hallsville, and Fred Barnett, Louisville, Ky.

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

1st Rural Route

The first rural mail route out of Maroa was established in 1896 and the first carrier was H. M. Morris. The route has been changed only slightly since. He used a cart or buggy with one or two horses depending on the condition of the roads. The scheduled time . for leaving the postoffice was nine o'clock in the morning and the route took the greater part of the day. There were many times he did not get back till after dark.

Mr. Morris was paid at first \$600 per year and was required to pay for the up-keep of the team, buggy and harness. He re-

1857 Grave



Here is pictured the oldest grave stone in this area. It was placed there in 1857, just three years after the founding of Maroa. The stone is located in Ridge Cemetery at the grave of Mrs. Deborah Weaver who passed away on November 23, 1857. Her husband was Thomas Weaver.

Another stone, for the infant daughter of Dr. J. W. Thayer, founder of the Christian Church. was placed there in 1859.

It was in Septembe 1854 that the North West quarter of Section 11, Township 18 N, Range 2 East was surveyed as the Town of Ma-

The Town on Thursday began the celebration of its anniversary with a series of colorful festivities. Notable among the various Centennial activities has been the spirit of community cooperation.

Maroa men did their part to call attention to the Centennial celebration by growing a wide variety of beards and joining an organization known as "Brothers of the Brush."

Local women wore old-time costumes to contribute to the Centennial spirit. They joined a group called "Sister of the Swish."

A Centennial dinner was held on August 27, drew a crowd of over 350 to hear Lt. Governor John W. Chapman speak. John H. Crocker was toastmaster at the affair. Clubs, fraternal groups, service,

social and religious organizations entered into the centennial spirit by holding special events in keeping with the observance.

They also joined businessmen and other individuals in a cooperative effort to raise funds to finance the overall program.

Preliminary activities included union church services by integration and with additional services on Monday and Tuesday evening. Wednesday night the Firemen sponsored a dance at which time the King and Queen of today were crowned.

The three days of the Centen nial Celebraton will be opened each morning by the ringing of church bells. Contests for the youngsters will be the feature of each morning and the early afternoon of Thursday and Friday.

Thursday afternoon will have an Antique Show, Flower Show and the Fish Fry. There will be free acts in the afternoon and evening.

On Friday the day's activities will continue with the Antique and Flower Shows with more free acts in the afternoon and evening. Special evening events will be the judging of beards, a style show and a square dance.

Three parades are on the program for the final day Sept. 25. A children's parade will be held in the morning and a tricycle pa rade at noon. The Centennial Day parade consisting of scores of floats and hundreds of marchers will start at 1 p.m. There also will be contests, afternoon and eve ning free acts, the antique show and a square dance. Final event of the day will be the awarding of an automobile.

A carnival will be in operation during the afternoon and evening of each day.

Bob Bolen served as general chairman of the Centennial Council which was composed of anyone who wanted to help with the celebration. Numerous other individuals served as chairman of various activites or helped in other capacities. There was no remuneration other than the self-satisfaction that came from staging perhaps the most successful civic undertaking in the city's 100 year history.

The Centennial Committees will meet Thursday, Sept. 30th to determine their work for the celebration. Treasurer Leo Ruble reports \$343 received last week from the King and Queen contests.



MAY ASK FOR ASSIGNMENT OF SAME LICENSE NUMBER

Motor vehicle owners who wish to retain their current license numbers may begin submitting re-assignment applications for 1955 plates on Friday, October 1, Secretary of State Charles F. Carpentier said today.

The re-assignment period extends through November 1, Secretary Carpenter said. He pointed out that applicants should write "Re-assignment requested" in the space on the application blank reserved for "Remarks."

All numbers whose re-assign ment is not requested by the close of the working day on November 1 will be available for assignment to other applicants, Mr. Carpentier said.

Application blanks will be distributed in two weeks prior to October 1 to notaries public, banks, currency exchanges, newspaper offices and automobile dealers, Secretary Carpentier said.

The 1955 plates will bear the colors of the Fighting Illini of the University of Illinois, orange and blue. The numerals will be orange and the background blue. The slogan, "Land of Lincoln," will appear across the bottom of the plates, and the legend, "19 Illinois 55," across the top, Mr. Carpentier said.

To All Voters of Macon County

Are you properly registered to vote at the General Election November 2, 1954?

The Registration Act of 1941, passed by the Illinois State Legislature, requires that every elector of Macon County must register in person, in order to be eligible to vote at any Primary, General or Special Election at which any State Officer is to be nominated or elected.

All persons who have not registered in Macon County may do so until October 4, 1954 in the office and until October 5, 1954 in their precinct.

All persons who have registered in Macon County and have changed address must transfer registration not later than October 5, 1954.

All persons who have registered in Macon County and have changed name (by marriage or otherwise) must register anew in person not later than October 4, 1954.

All persons who will have attained the age of twenty-one (21) by the 2nd day of November, 1954, may register now and until October 4, 1954.

All persons who are in the Armed Services of the United States of America, and are twenty-one (21) years of age or over and who are qualified voters of Macon County, are eligible to vote without being registered. Parent or relative may make application for them in the County Clerk's Office, Room 203, County Building, Decatur, Illinois.

DON'T lose your right to vote by not being properly registered. Check your registration. Call 3-3659 or come to the Election Registration Office, Room 401, County Building, Decatur, Illinois. Hours 8:30 A. M. to 4:30 P. M. Daily. 8:30 A. M. to 12:00 Noon on Saturdays.
