The results of Maroa's efforts in the third period was a touchdown and point by Reed. The fourth period found Maroa still trailing 19-14, but they weren't to be stopped. Maroa marched about 60 yards with Garren finally plunging for the winning touchdown. Allsup added the extra point. Maroa then staved off on Assumption threat the rest of the game. Cazolett of Assumption did about 75 per cent of Assumption's ball handling. Maroa came out the winner by a very narrow margin of 21 to 19.

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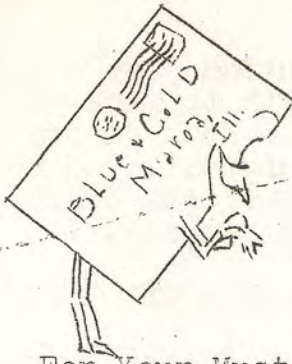

Betty Lou Stoutenborough was chairman of the other group. She had Mr. Keyes show pictures of the trip he took.

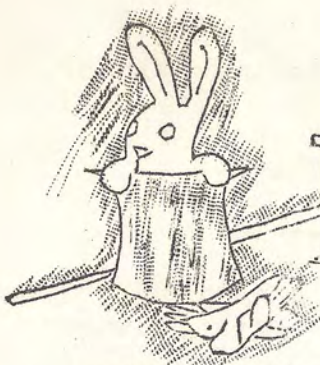
A musical trip was taken by all with Margaret Beasley as Stewardess, Maude Davis as pianist, and Helen Penn reading the story.

Take time to laugh--it is the music of the soul."

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

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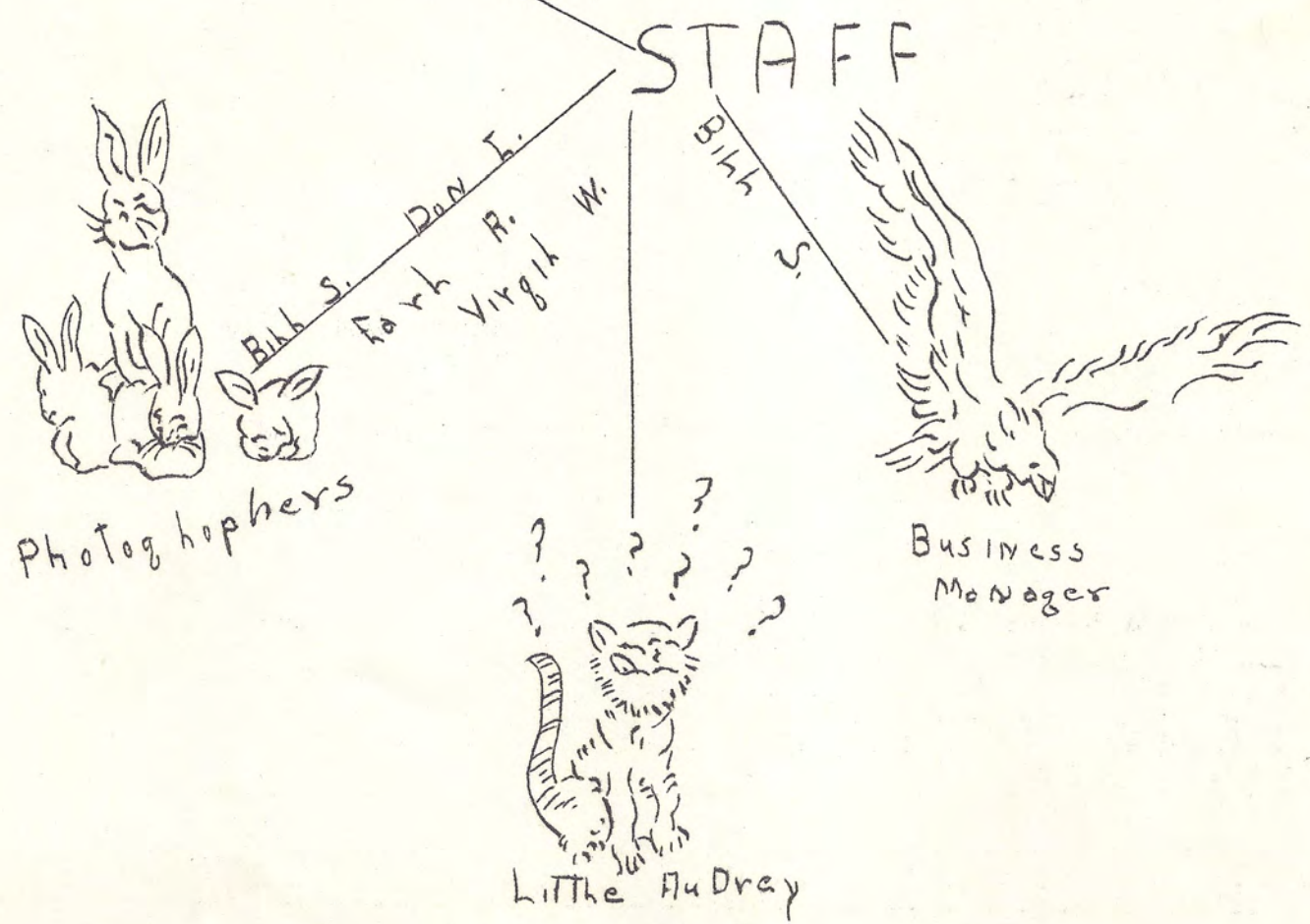
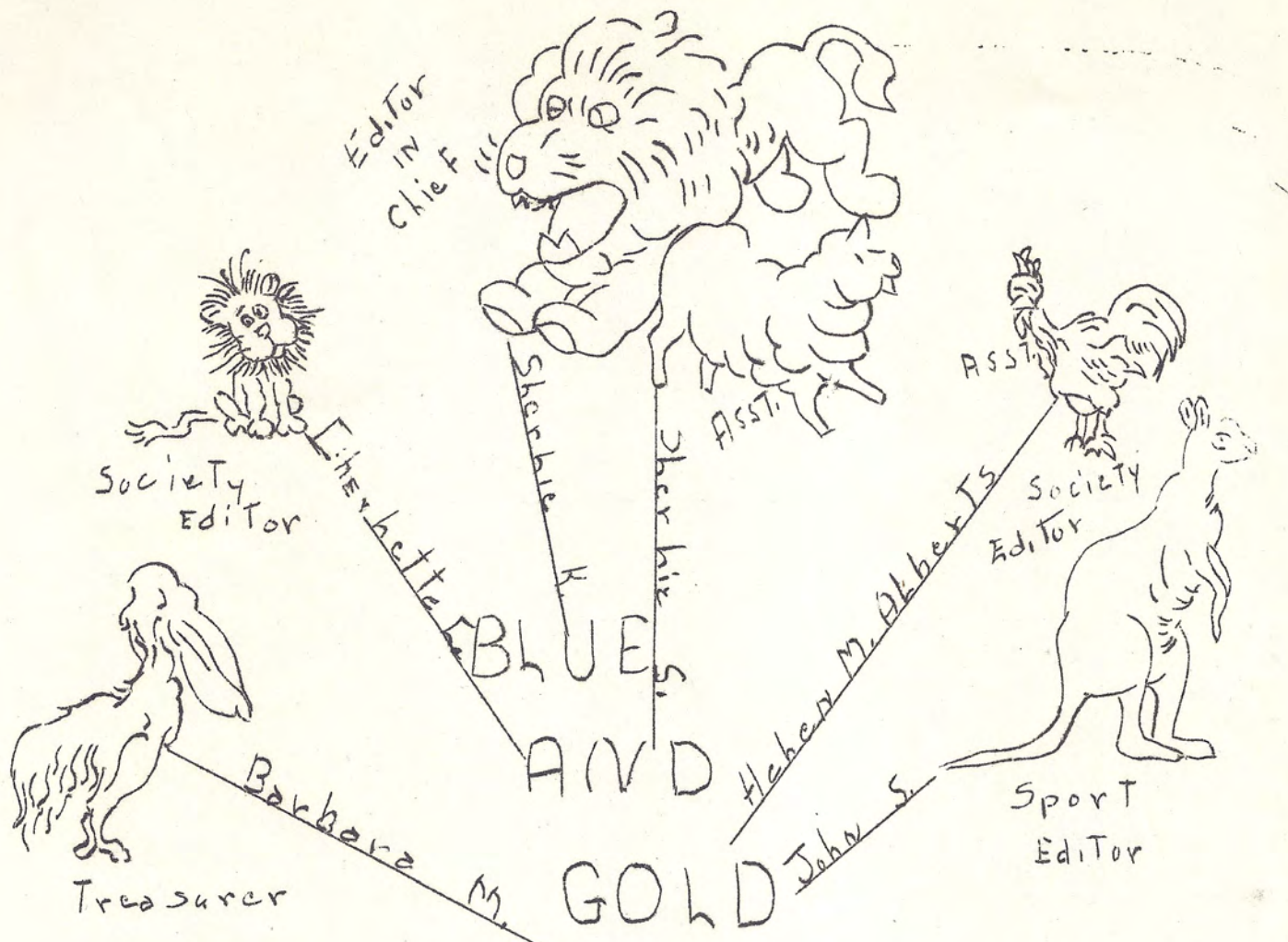

At this time in the game Blue Mound threatened close to the Maroa goal, but failed to score. Final score was 34 to 0 in favor of the Maroa Trojans. Maroa completed seven out of eight passes. The attempts of extra point were all good except on the second touch down. Quarterback Wayne Bennett received a broken collarbone to put him on the side lines for the remainder of the season. This was a hard blow to the Maroa team.

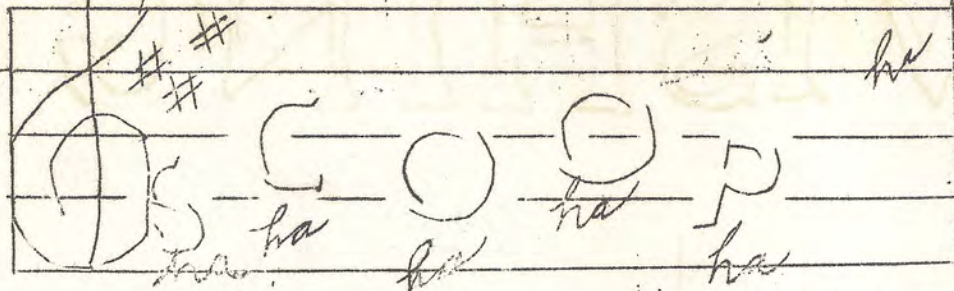
