Paid to Read Other's Mail

Perhaps the most interesting teminine war work being done on the island of Bermuda is that of the British Censors who are, for the large part, women. Of course, the authorities let you know as little as possible about the censorship work for obvious reasons. Moreover, this is a touchy subject among some British and Americans, for every bit of American mail that goes across the Atlantic whether by boat or plane is delayed at Bermuda for inspection.

The Censor staff has taken over two of the island's grandest hotels, the Princess and the Bermudiana. Even if you're the King's niece you can't get into them without a pass. The hotels are divided they are acclimating themselves to up into language sections so that letters of any one tongue are handled on one floor, while letters in another language wind up in a different part of the building. The duty of the censors is to sift through the mail and packages searching for any atom of information concerning the war that might fall into the wrong hands.

In most cases the information given is innocently but carelessly put down in black and white. What the censors are really expert at is detecting information not innocently given. So well-trained are these women that they can pick up a letter and tell practically instantaneously whether it's a code message. And up to this time they have never come across a code that couldn't be dicibhered. Mail that omes in by Clippen is delayed two days, while mail that comes by boat is usually held up a little longer.

· Of course censorship applies not only to letters, but also to parcles, registered mail, books, magazines, and in fact, anything that is sent by mail or freight. Some letters are destroyed after a transcript or photostat has been made of them. There is a growing accummulation of money and valuable confiscated. These are usually son by Nazis in the Western Hemisphere who are always happy to give the boys back home a helping hand.

The censors' work is highly intense and secretive and strenuous. These women's personal lives are not their own. As if this weren't enough, they quarters because, there is such a dearth of eligible male escorts in Bermuda, But, like other Bermuda women. the discomforts of war, and ask no glory.

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25 Wilhemstresser Berlin, Germany February 6, 1936

My dear Alma,

Surprised to hear from me? can imagine that you are, for it's been a long time since we've corresponded. I decided that it was about time that one of us pay the other a pen and ink visit, so I took it upon myself to do so. I suppose if we could meet sometime and renew our friendship, we would write more often than every few years, As it is, I feel almost like a stranger, don't you? All that we have to remember about each other are those childhood days that we spent so happily together. Of course that was before you and your folks went to the United States of America to live. I think it's a shame you have to live away over there. don't think I'd like to live with so many different races, and under such a government -- a democracy! What do people know about ruling themselves? What they need is a strong, brilliant leader like we have here. I wish you could have; stayed here and lived with us. [1] don't see how any tru German could be satisfied to live over there.

Things have surely changed here, since you left. At least that's what Mother says. I guess conditions were pretty bad when I was still a little girl. Now Germany is rising out of the poverty she

was left in after the war.

On the eve of Hitler's birthday, two years ago; I was initiated into the B.D.M., the League of German girls. I was given a uniform decorated with emblems, letters, triangles and swastikas. I'm very proud to be wearing it. Girls as young as fourteen can join, but I was sixteen before I did. You see it's only been in existence a few years. We consider those girls that don't join as enemies to our State, for they aren't doing what the Fuehrer wants them to. says something is to be done, then it should be. If it weren't for our Fuehrer, Germany wouldn't be rising to her proper place in the


world. Heil Hitler!

Anna is going to a school for the Jungmadel her in Berlin. don't know whether you remember her or not. I've never mentioned her in my letters before. She was just a baby when you left. She is thirte n now. She seems to like it pretty well at the school. She receives instructions in every phase of house work and cooking, care of children and sick people; and detailed sex instructions. She seems rather young to be learn. ing about such things, but all of us girls remember that we're to be the future mothers of our super race. She also learns about the Fuhrers's life and many Nazi songs that are being sung. She's really a very busy girl. Athletic contests and Party activities take up her afternoons, several evenings a week are devoted to Party meetings at the girls' troop head quarters. Over the week-ends she goes on semi-military hikes. In the B.D.M., we have the same cours es as Anna has, but of course they are more advanced.

It's compulsory in the B.D.M. for the girls to spend part of their year in a camp. All of the eighteen year old girls went together this year. We just got back a few days ago. It was a new experience for me. We lived in' low wooden barracks, got up at six in the morning, prepared our own meals, and then had an hour's instructions in ideology. Every day we carried on a heavy sports program. One day, I was sent to help a nearby peasant woman with her housework. I didn't mind it at all. In the evenings we sang, listened to more lectures on our duties, and retired at ten. Twice a week, we had an evening off. took walks to a labor camp and spent the evenings with the young men there. I really had a good time, but I was glad to get back to Berlin.

Carl belongs to the Hitler Youth They take long marches, and go on military maneuvers. He's doing quite well. We're really proud of him. In his school studies, Hit-

MAROA VS. ARGENTA

The old rivalry between Argenta and Maroa was renewed with a hard-fought, clean-cut, basket-ball game. The Trojans riding on the crest of a 8 win and 1 lost were confident to stretch their winnings to 9 games, but instead they were upset by a big, hard fighting argenta team. Like most all Argenta-Maroa games the game was a low-scoring, tight-defensive game. The game started with the Trojans taking a 6 to 2 lead the first quarter, but only to let Argenta creep up, for a 8 to 6 lead at half time for Maroa.

As the game progressed it grew hotter and hotter, and began to shape so that every basket would be the game winner. Maroa was ahead 19 to 18 with about 20 seconds of the game remaining. Bennett was bringing the ball down the floor and came in contact with Bennett of Argenta. Bennett of Maroa was called for charging.
