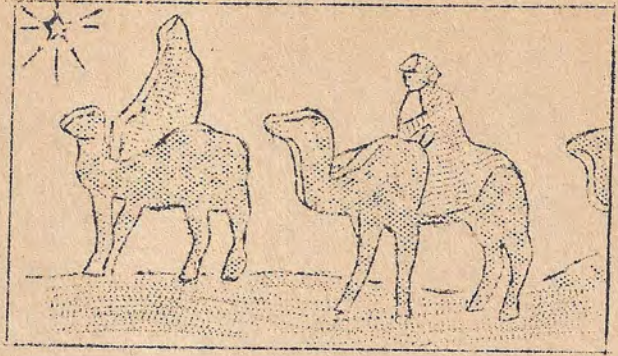

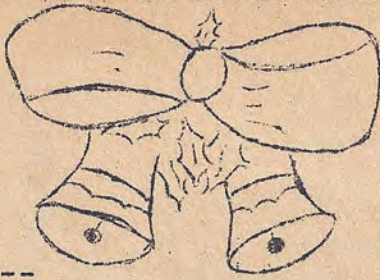
PEP COMMITTEE

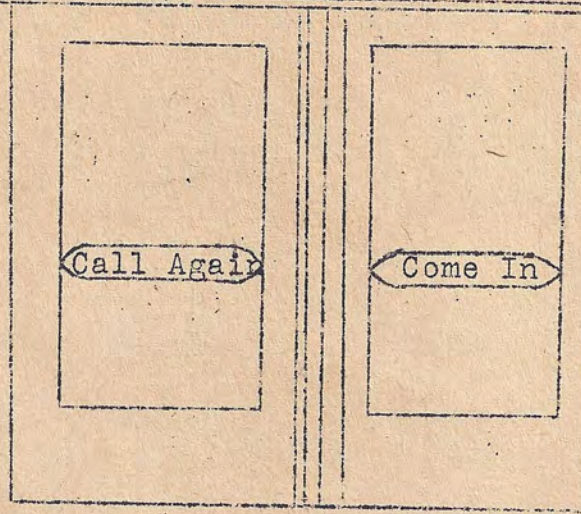
