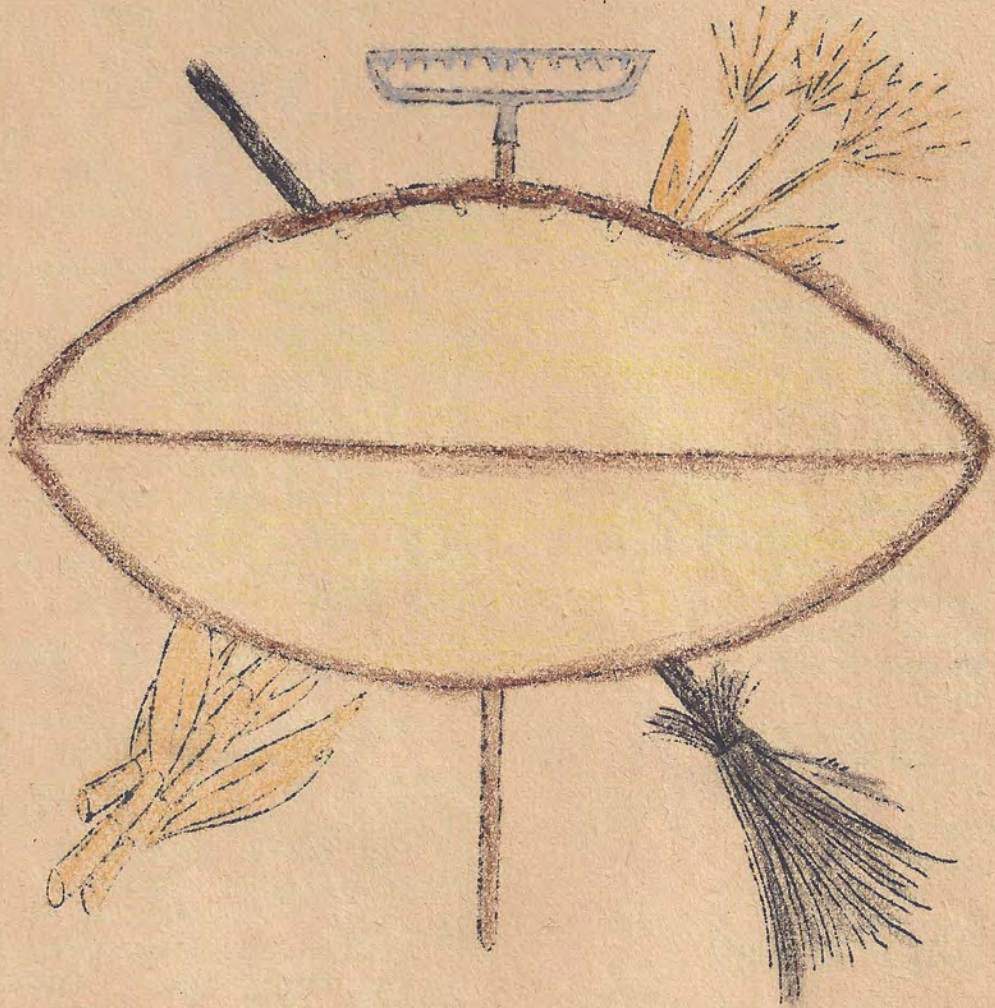

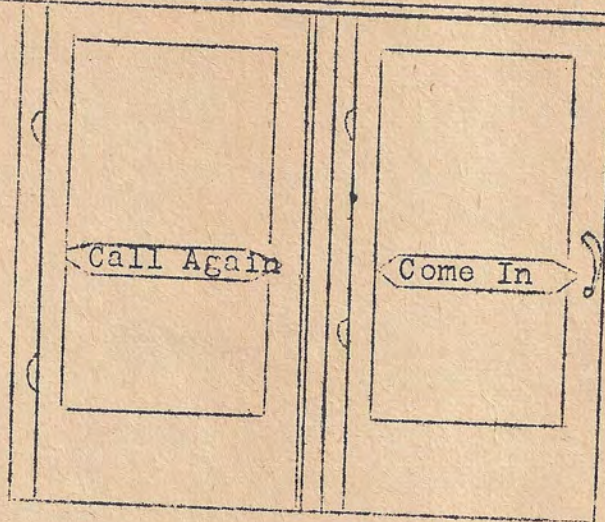

## FIRE PREVENTION

Are there any fire hazards in your home, office, or school? Yes this is just another question but wait, are you sure of that? Do you know that last year there were 14,175 fires in Illinois amounting to total losses, of \$11,520,083?

Most fires have their origin in some simple hazard or thoughtless act. The principle causes of fire are matches and smoking, misuse of electrical equipment and appliances, rubbish and litter, unsafe heating apparatus and defective flues, and carelessness with gasoline and petroleum products. These can be controlled with a slight effort.

Check your home and make it fire-safe from the attic to the cellar. Children should be given special attention, because they are at the age when they can acquire the life-long habit of being safety-minded.

We, at Maroa High, were lucky to have one of the firemen from Decatur come out last week and show us three short movies on fire prevention and methods of how efficient the firemen of today are.

October 7 to 13 is fire prevention week and the committee is sponsoring an essay contest. These essays are on fire prevention in the home, school, and on the farm. The essays will be graded on: (1) Content of subject matter, (2) Originality of presentment (3) Mechanics, (4) Neatness. Prizes are: First-\$10, second-\$3, third-\$2. They are not to be more than 500 words for high school students and 300 for grade school students. Don't put it off till next week, or when you can get to it, do it now, tomorrow maybe too late. Let's not wait until the fire breaks out, get rid of those hazards and keep on the alert for any danger signs. NJH
