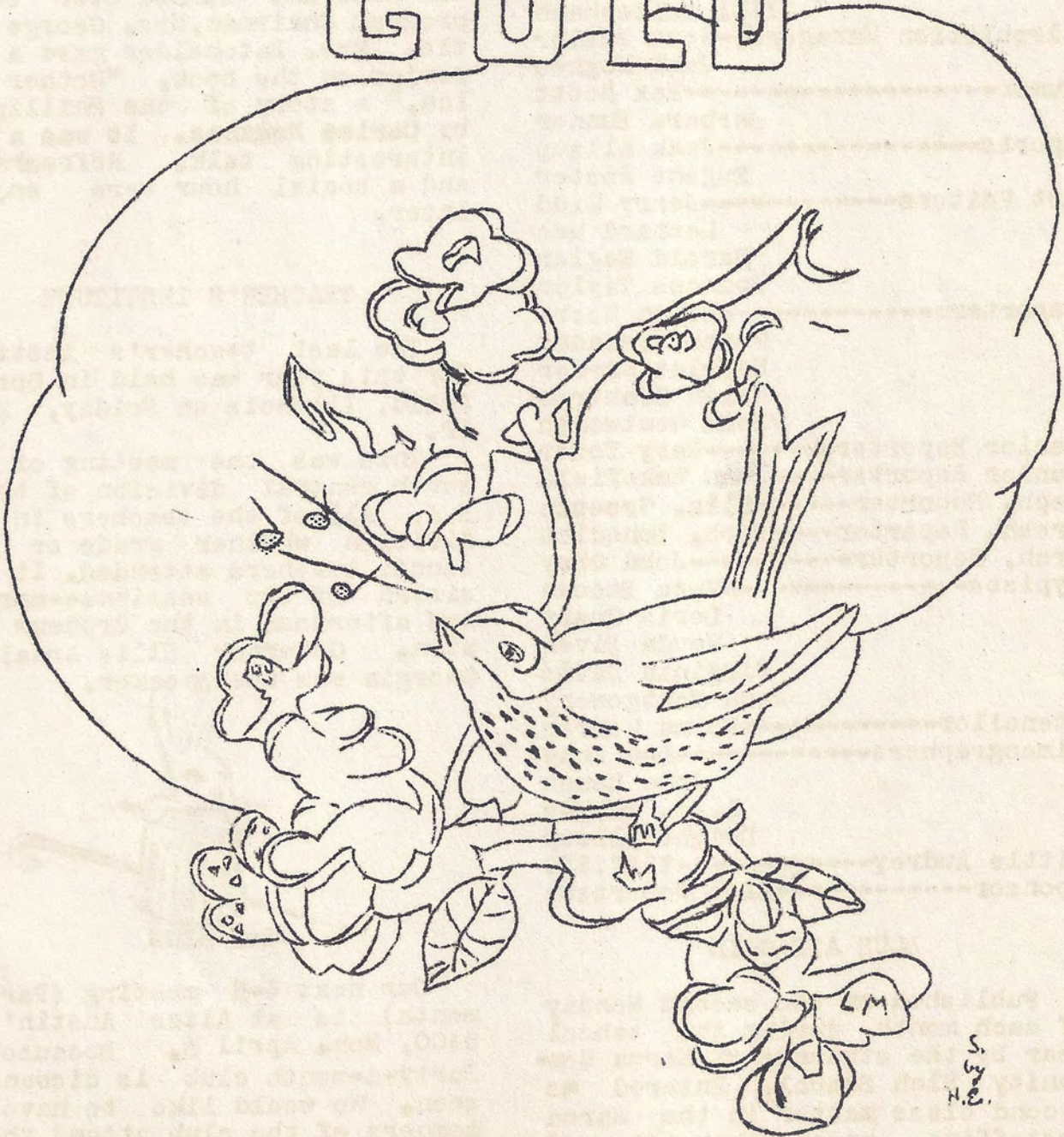

And seeth two angels in white sitting, the one at the head, and the other at the feet, where the body of Jesus had lain.

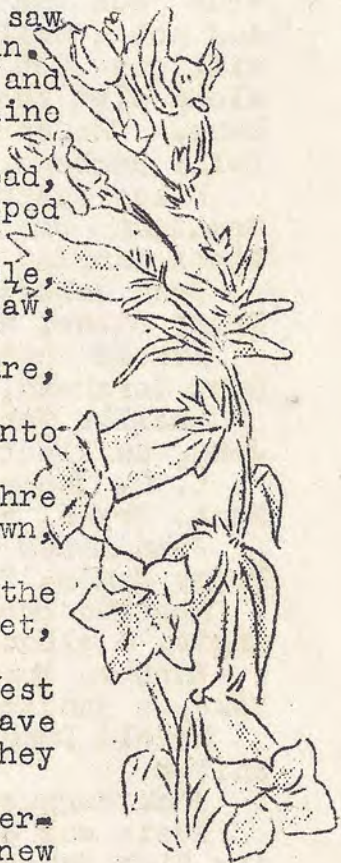
And they say unto her. Woman, why weepest thou? She saith unto them, Because they have taken away my Lord, and I know not where they have laid him.

Then saith he to Thomas, Reach hither thy finger, and behold my hands; and reach hither thy hand, and thrust it into my side: and be not faithless, but believing.

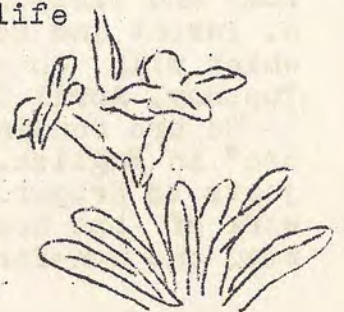
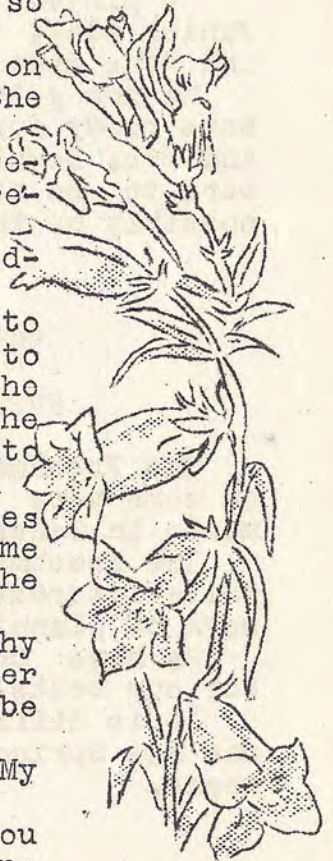
And Thomas answered and said unto him, My Lord and my God.

Miss Kelly: They are deaf and dumb--they bowl every Wednesday.

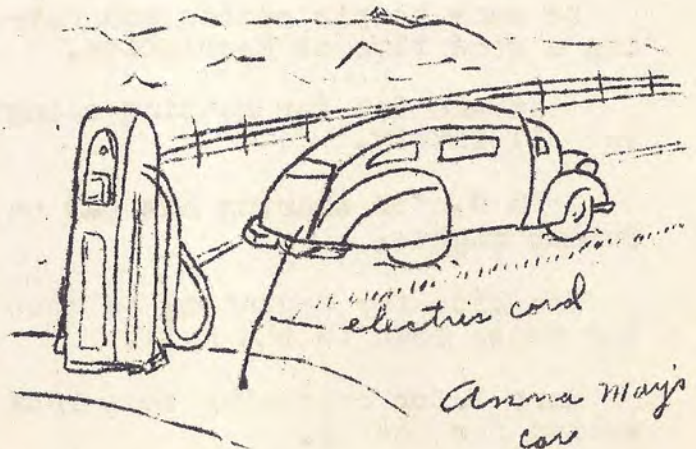

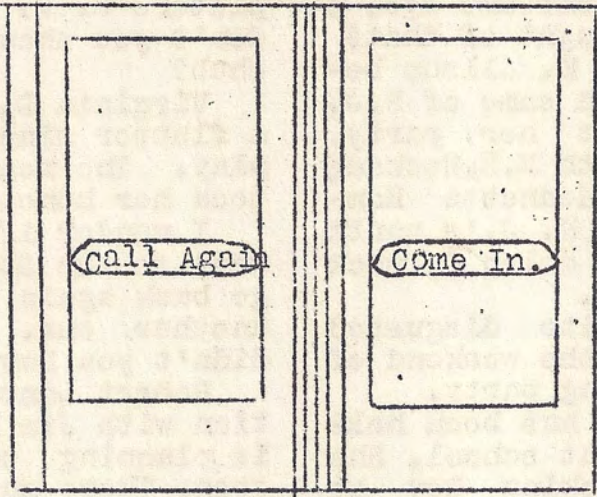
