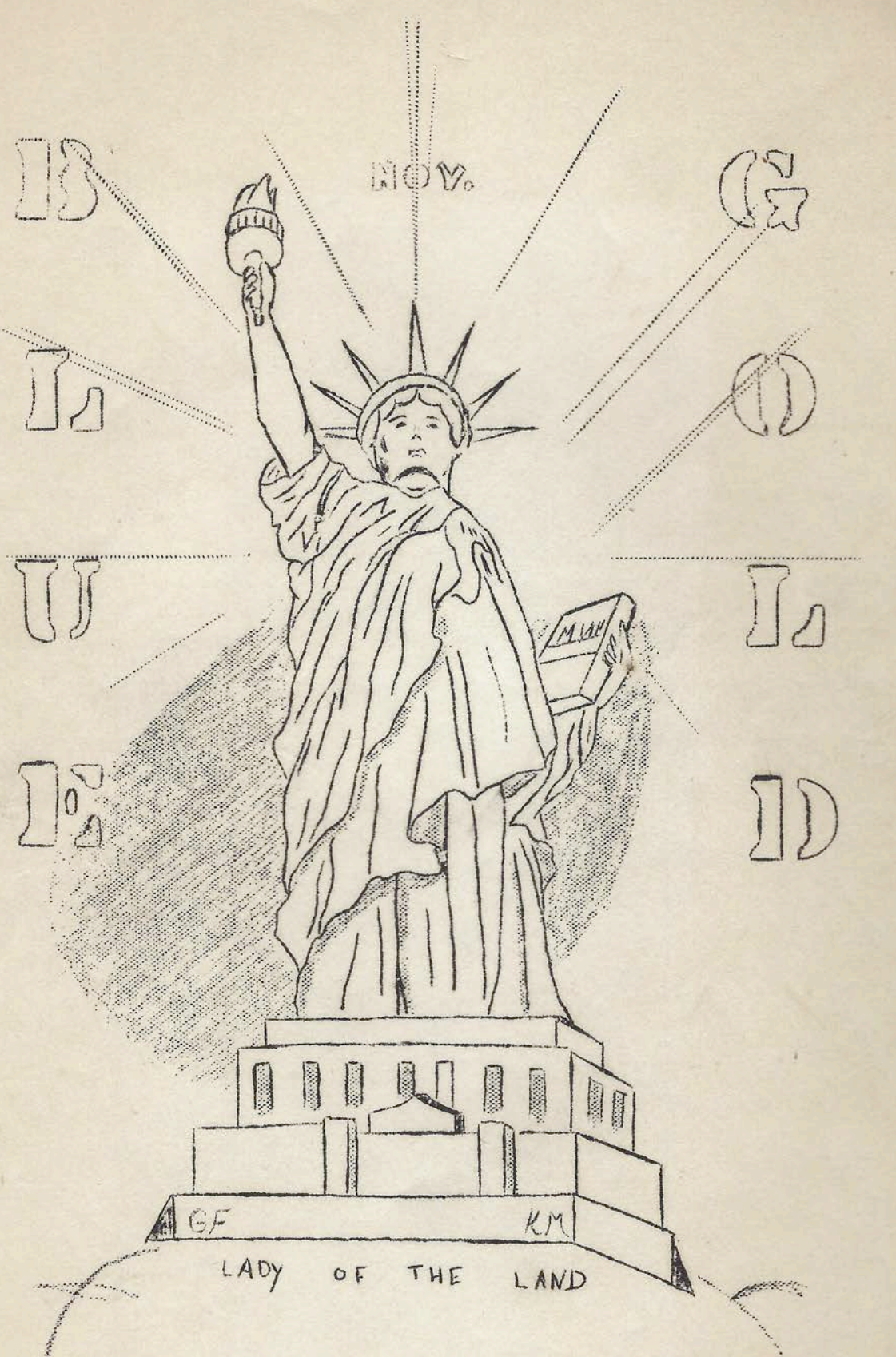

The annual district convention of the High School Student Council Association was held in Decatur, Ill. Saturday, Nov. 6. Six members of the local high school student council, namely, Allan Alexander, Fred Staudt, Sidney Foulk, Pat Hoffman, Robert Broom and Jean Roberts, together with their advisor Mr. J. E. Kitowski attended the sessions which were held in the morning at the Decatur High School, and in the afternoon at the Y. M. C. A. Luncheon was served at noon at the "Y"

The theme of the convention was "We Build For Tomorrow." Highlights of the meeting were the talks by Dr. Fred Proff of the University of Illinois Education Department, an experienced authority in youth groups, Mr. Bob Emmons, Decatur, a member of the University of Illinois Student Senate, and the valuable discussion groups arranged according to the size of the enrollment of the schools in attendance.

Since it is the responsibility of the school to create an atmosphere in which the tenets of democracy may grow and to teach boys and girls how to apply them to the management of the institutions of our democratic society, the student council can be one of the most important organizations in a school. It is definitely not a governing body, but a sounding board for student opinion. It has a real opportunity for leadership and service, and offers an excellent method for giving pupils a habit of mind that will business a matter of special interest to the private citizen. Student participation in the affairs of the school, when the activities are properly planned and adequately directed, gives immeasurable aid in the development of desirable atti-

Maroa beat a Lovington team 19-0 to clinch a tie for the Soya Conference title for the first time since 1942. Only Bethany stands in the way of an undisputed championship.

The Trojans scored in the second, third, and fourth quarters.

In the second quarter, Dave Lynch went 5 yards for a T.D. Gary Luallen passed to Don Wisnasky for the extra point leaving a 7-0 halftime edge.

In the third quarter Ken Chalcraft passed 45 yards to Don Wisnasky for another T.D. The P.A.T. was not good.

In the fourth quarter, Lovington fumbled on a punt return and Gary Luallen recovered on the 15 yard line. L. McCay went the last 3 yards for the final T.D. The P.A.T. was blocked.

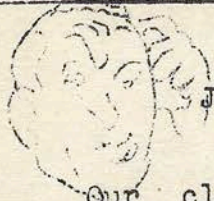

We elected two flag bearers to put up the flag each morning. They are "Grit" Creekmur and John Parker. We think they'll do a good job.

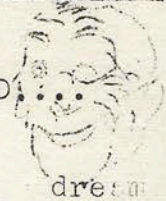
Our play turned out very good and we were very proud of every one that helped with it and was in the cast. Congratulations for doing such a good job!!!

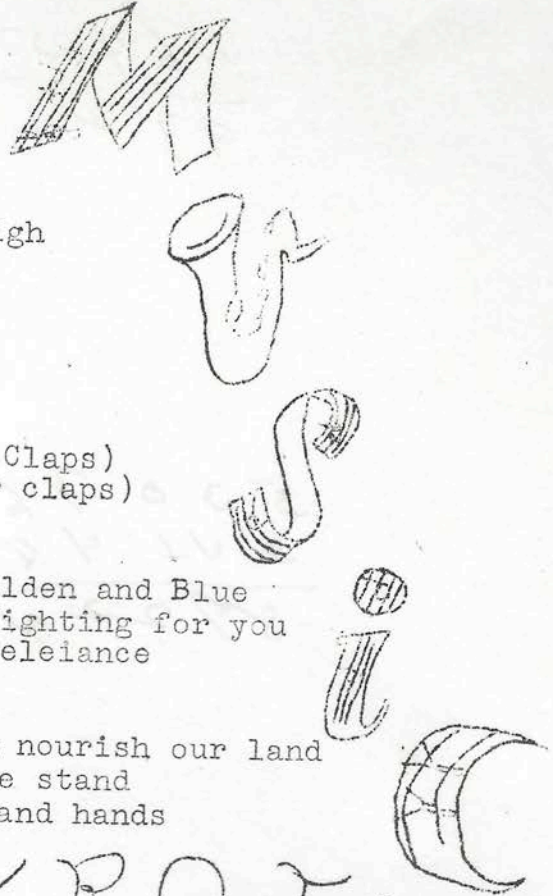

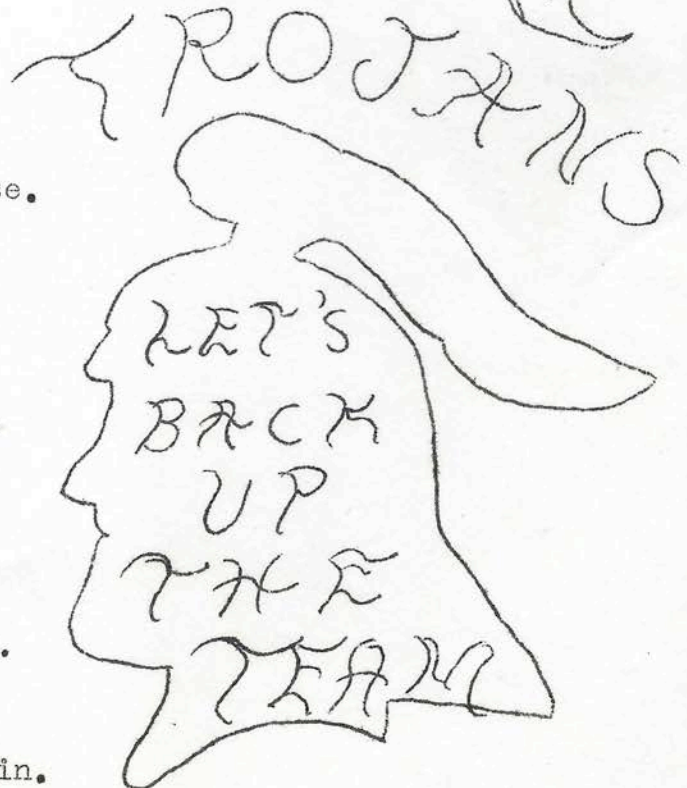
