MAROA-FORSYTH HIGH RECEIVE SCIENCE EQUIPMENT

The Maroa-Forsyth High School science department is in receipt of over \$1,000.00 worth of free radiological equipment from the U. S. Government.

The equipment consists of eight different items, namely two radiological Dosimeters for measuring exposures during training exercises; two Survey Meters, or Geiger Counters for personal monitoring of food and water; two additional Radiological Survey Meters for general area surveys, and specialized surveys in high gamma radiation fields and for detecting beta radiation; two Dosimeters for measuring radiation exposures of defense workers; one Dosimeter Charger; and two Comparison Standard Meters which provide a method of measuring, or comparing the radio-activity in food and drinking water.

These valuable instruments will be used in connection with units of instruction in biology, physics, and in chemistry. It is another way in which to keep in touch with modern science procedures. All items were on exhibit at the Science Fair.

Mr. Frank Johnson, math teacher at MFHS, served as toastmaster. The program consisted of a vocal solo by Mr. F. B. Belshe, Dean of the Undergraduate School at Illinois State Normal University. The evening was concluded by a social hour.

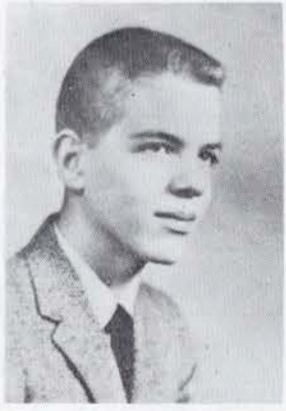

This annual award--a handsome bronze medal--is given at graduation to the senior student who achieves the highest scholastic standing in science subjects. It is presented in almost 7,000 schools. Since its introduction in 1933, there have been 125,000 winners; and a substantial percentage have been encouraged by the Award to follow scientific careers.

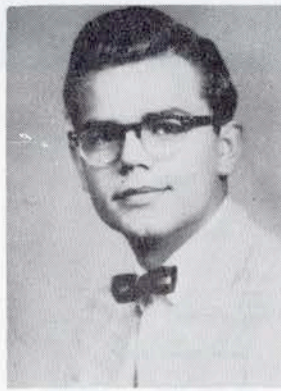
Yes, of course, this is D'Wayne Lynch.

He plans to work in Champaign after graduation. Gussed who he is? None other than Alfred Joseph Brown.

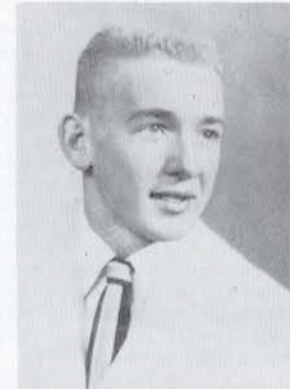
This senior girl, whose favorite subject is typing, has an interesting hobby of writing to Gordon.

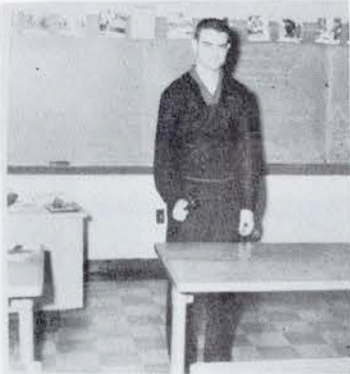

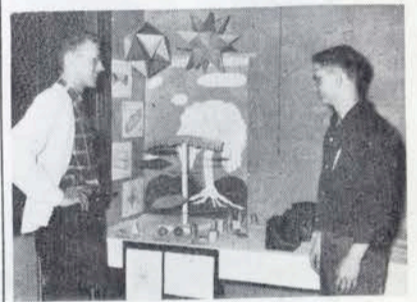
Large Crowd Attends Science Fair Held On March 29th

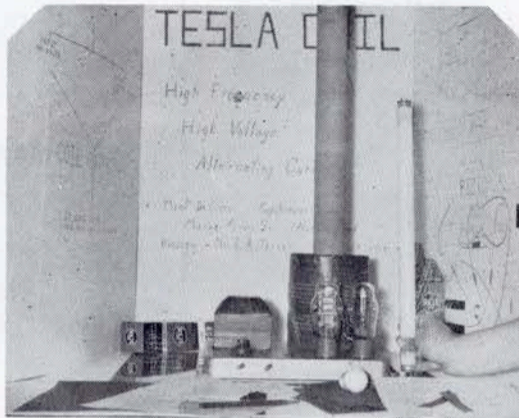
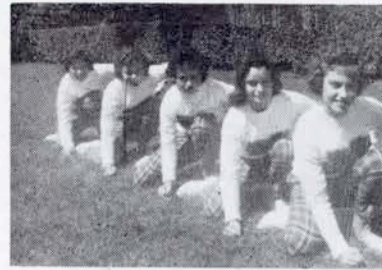
