

Our school had the political bug that swept the nation this year. Under the direction of the student council,

registration was held during which all students were given a chance to register and 181 of 191 students registered dur-

ing the two day period.

On Monday, November 7, an all school political rally was held in the Maroa Grade School gym. Rousing campaign speeches were given by the following students: Sonny Schroll for William Stratton and Samuel Witwer; Marilyn Watson for Otto Kerner and Paul Douglas; Suzie Spreckelmeyer for Senator Kennedy; and David Garren for Vice-President Nixon. As a climax to these speeches, a "T. V. debate" was held to present the views of the two major political parcies. A panel of reporters, Judy Hincle, Tom Luallen, Janet Parker, and Gary Vermilyea, questioned David Lemons and Suzie Spreckelmeyer for the Democrats and Republicans Gary Archey and Bradley Leinhart.

The issues presented and minds made up, a mock election was held on Tuesday, November 8. Richard Nixon, Paul Douglas and Otto Kerner won in the school election. Class by class, here is how the school voted:

The Trojan football team and cheer-leaders were honored with a dinner at the Redwood Restuarant on November 15. The merchants of Maroa sponsored the dinner and also attended. Mr. Smith gave a short speech about the Trojans and their winning season. Coach Boyd introduced the merchants who were attending. He also introduced the players and cheerleaders.
