

Trojans Take 4th Place in Meridian Tournament

The Trojans took 4th place in the Meridian Conference Basketball tournament at Findlay. The Trojans downed Niantic 57-45 in their first game. Ftnier scored 18 points to lead the Trojans who shoot .411 making 23 of 56 field goal attempts. Niantic shoots a .339.

In the 2nd game Maroa romped Illiopolis 58-38. The Trojans jumped off to a 17-2 first quarter lead and a 35-8 half time lead. The reserves took over in the second half and coasted on to victory. Mitchell had 13 points for the Trojans, high for the Trojans.

The Trojans were besten 72-42 in the semi-finals by Stonington. The Trojans had a 16-13 lead at the end of the first quarter. Elston Mitchell took game scoring honors with 23 points. Stoningtons half time lead was 32-26. The Trojans shot .268 from the field while Stonington shot .373.

Blue Mound trimmed the Trojans 52-47 for 3rd place. The game was number 6 in 7 mights for the Trojans. Blue Mound tied the game at 36-36 at the start of the 1th quarter and went ahead to stay. Stonington beat Macon 63-56 for the Championship.
