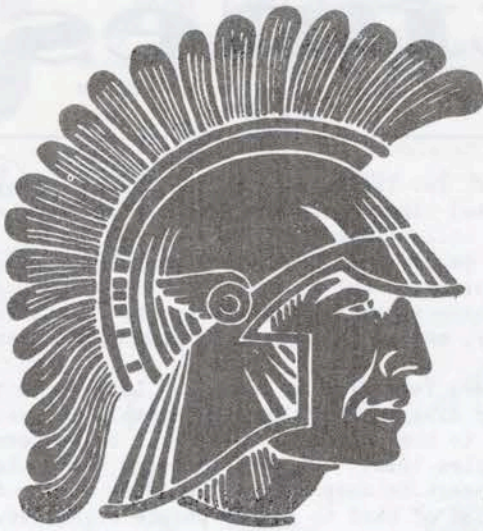








Band Performs

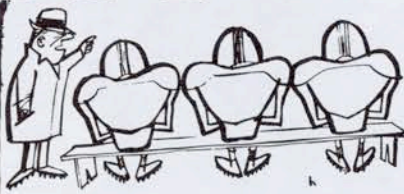

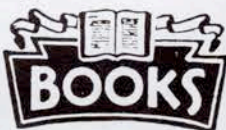
The third game of the season the Trojans racked up another bone crushing victory over Niantic 14 to 6. The touchdowns were scored by Larry Day and Terry Lienhart.
