



THE FUEL SHORTAGE

In the days of closed gas stations, flickering lights and cold houses, we now take a look at the fuel shortage from our school. Mr. Hardin contributed some information concerning the said, fuel shortage. He "Our school receives a certa in amount of fuel month. We must make this amount meet our needs. As of now, we will not need to close the school for any reason due to the shortage. Mr. Irvin gave some interesting information, too. He said we need more gas this year than last year to transport the junior high students from Forsyth. We receive our gas from Standard Oil. We are getting 90% less gas than we got last year.

We have had to cut down on athletic runs, and run only one bus to junior high games. Mr. Irvin has asked the teachers in our district to take fewer field trips and only then when absolutely necessary for the kids to benefit from.

Fuel oil has become a problem too. We get our fuel from Leishner Oil in Decatur, and they have had to cut down on deliveries. The Junior High burns fuel oil and to conserve this amount they have turned down the

thermostates. Mr. Irvin has asked not to burn unnecessary lights.

Some teachers have donated their opinions to this problem, too. Mr. Campbell said that the only thing that ever really buggs him about the gas shortage is the 55 mile-per-hour speed limit.

It took 'a little time to get used to driving slow but he finds it more relaxing and safer to drive at a slower speed. Mr. Scarlett said, that there is no fuel shortage, only an energy crisis which means that the fuels are available, but that the means of recovering them as a processing them are not e
